About the Workshop

Philosophy in the modern Islamic World as well as on a global scale is not situated in a neutral thought space, rather, it takes place on a fundamentally and constantly contested and contingent ground: the political. The political constitutes the conflict zone in which actors from the Islamic world and the Global North take part in complex processes of (re-)negotiating the foundations of politics, identity, and the legitimization of socio-political inclusion.

Via a series of case studies, this workshop looks at different ways in which intellectuals and philosophers from the modern Islamic world intervene in this zone of the political. It asks about their conceptions and strategies of critique, how they interact with their peers and with activists from the Islamic World and from the Global North and how they approach major concepts such as freedom, the secular, the Enlightenment, the good life, equality, or citizenship. Furthermore, the workshop addresses more theoretical reflections such as how modes of subjectivation influence the implicit presuppositions at work in the mentioned concepts as well as in what ways thinkers re-evaluate different archives of knowledge (Islamic, Western, or otherwise) and how these discourses are shaped by the political.

Overall, the workshop explores ways in which reflections on the political in relation to concrete philosophical debates may open up pathways to develop the research field of *Philosophy in the modern Islamic World* and envision transregional and decolonial academic interaction in the field.

About the Network

The scholarly network *Philosophie in der islamischen Welt der Moderne / Philosophy in the modern Islamic World* aims at further developing an emerging research field. In constant exchange with colleagues from the MENA-region, the Network explores transdisciplinary and transregional perspectives of engaging with philosophical discourse from the region and pursues the medium- and long-term goal of institutionally anchoring the barely developed research field of Philosophy in the Modern Islamic World in research and teaching in the German-speaking as well as international academic landscape.

The network (funded by DFG 2021-2024) organises a series of lectures, workshops, and annual conferences at which core issues and key concepts in central thematic areas (history of philosophy, metaphysics, and political philosophy) as well as key texts in each of the central thematic areas are discussed. Furthermore, structure-building measures and research projects will be initiated, and concrete publications will be prepared to make the presence of philosophical thought in the Modern Islamic world and its ongoing entanglements with European intellectual history visible to the academic as well as the general public.

The website of the network *philosophy-in-the-modern-islamic-world.net* constantly informs about activities of the network and publishes news relevant to the field, it also hosts the blog *Reflections/Denkanstöße* which sheds light on current philosophical debates in the region and discusses theoretical issues as to how an adequate academic engagement with these discourses would look like.
